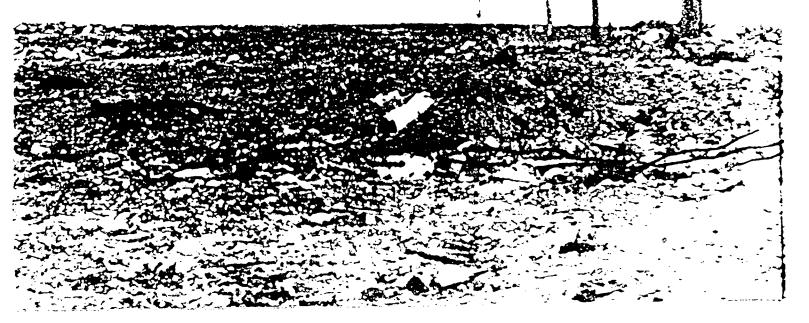


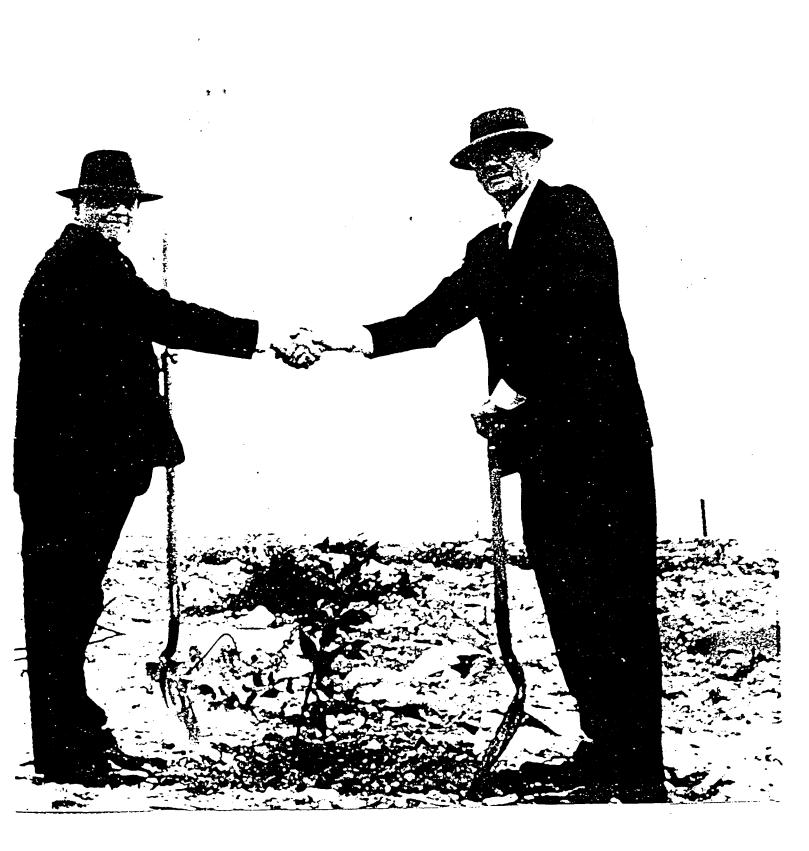
SYNOPSIS

Kay is frightened of the future and of the present, of life and of death, of loneliness and of love, she's frightened of trees that whither and die, frightened of shadow and of light, frightened of giving herself up to her dreams and her memories...

When a clairvoyant describes minutely the man of her life, Kay abruptly interrupts the constant stream of monogamous relationships, which had become her pattern, to set up home with Louis, the ex-boyfriend of a colleague. After a year of apparent happiness, her fears are rekindled; she turns away from Louis and withdraws inexorably into herself...

That's when her older sister, Sweetie, appears. Sweetie is impulsive and untidy; a fat adolescent who - her father, Gordon, still stubbornly insists - is the "artist" of the family. She loses no time in turning Kay's ordered world upside down with her capricious demands, her voracious sensuality, her enormous apetite and her terrifying rages. Kay struggles gamely with this whirlwind, but she can't escape Sweetie's overpowering influence, her thirst for love and her inexhaustible energy. When in the end Sweetie disappears, Kay, now calmer, rediscovers the pleasures of life and of love...





JANE CAMPION

(Director)

Jane Campion, who is 34, was born in New Zealand. She studied painting and sculpture and obtained a diploma in anthropology before attending the Australian Film* and Television School, where she directed three short films: PEEL, PAS-SIONLESS MOMENTS and A GIRL'S OWN STORY which was her final year project.



In 1984, she wrote and directed a 30 minute film, AFTER HOURS, for the Women's Film Unit; it won the XL Elder Award at the Melbourne International Festival

In 1985, she made a television movie, 2 FRIENDS, from a screenplay by Helen Garner

In 1986, Jane Campion caused a sensation at the Cannes Film Festival: PASSIONLESS MOMENTS, A GIRL'S OWN STORY and 2 FRIENDS were programmed in the "Un Certain Regard" section; and PEEL won the Palme d'Or for the best short film.

In the same year, 2 FRIENDS was also screened at Film Festivals in Edinburgh, Sydney and Melbourne; and in 1987 the Australian Film Institute gave it three awards: Best director, Best TV film and Best screenplay.

"The Cannes and overseas festival experience made me aware that people seemed to like the sort of films I'd started to make. It decided me on trying to make a modern low budget feature after my own style. I thought if we didn't ask for a lot of money, people would let us try something unusual. I felt it would be fantastic to make the film with the generation of film makers I had grown up with. For most of us it was our first feature."

1988-89: Jane Campion made SWEETIE.

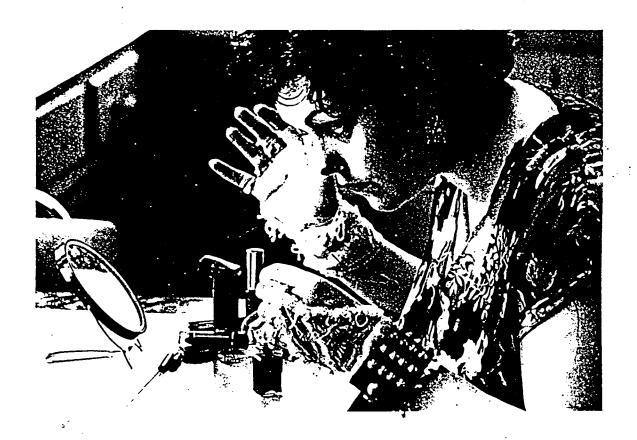

GENEVIEVE LEMON (Sweetie)

Genevieve Lemon graduated in drama from the University of New South Wales, studying in repertory at the Rocks players, Sydney. Recently, she has played roles in the Sydney and Melbourne debuts of "Steaming", "Steel Magnolias" and "When I was a Girl I Used to Scream and Shout".

KAREN COLSTON (Kay)

Karen Colston trained at Q Theatre, Penrith. "When she first auditioned for Kay, Karen was working as a salad-bar assistant in David Jones department store. By the time she was short listed, she was overseas in Sweden on an indefinite holiday. With great cool and characteristic strong faith Karen flew back, auditioned twice, and got the part."





TOM LYCOS (Louis)

Tom Lycos trained at Canberra Youth Theatre in 1979, and since then has performed in a variety of repertory theatres throughout the country. He has also toured Europe as a member of the Dutch performance group "KISS", and for a time was tutor in Drama to children on probation in Liverpool, U.K.

DOROTHY BARRY (Flo)

This is Dorothy Barry's first acting role, though she was a well-known figure in the late 1950's in the singing partnership "The Barry Sisters". Dorothy is presently occupied as a Variety and Country and Western singer at RSL and Leagues clubs throughout Australia.

JON DARLING (Gordon)

is not only an actor, he is also a prospector of opals, an amateur photographer, a carpenter and an avid explorer of the Australian bush. Now 65, he lives with his sister in Sydney.

JOHN MAYNARD

(Producer)

Maynard has known Jane Campion before she started making films, and although they wished to work together it was not until "SWEETIE" that the time was right.

Maynard prefers to work in a supportive role with creative people and is well known for taking risks with new talent. He has always had a strong belief in the value of a small indigenous film industry and has worked consistently to realise this aim.

"SWEETIE" is his third consecutive film to be selected for in competition at Cannes; the previous films being VIGIL 1984 and THE NAVIGATOR, A MEDIEVAL ODYSSEY 1988, both directed by Vincent Ward, with whom Maynard has worked for eight years.

His other feature films include SKIN DEEP in 1978 ("New Zealand's breakthrough film..." Variety) and STRATA in 1981 ("So bizarre that it is difficult to believe that anyone else -except Werner Herzog - would ever have considered it... Stills Magazine.)

Based in Sydney and Auckland, Maynard's next project is also with Jane Campion, this time as co-producer (producer: Bridgit Ikin) on a three part drama "TO THE IS-LAND" based on the autobiographies of Janet Frame, with principal photography commencing in July in New Zealand, London and Spain.

WILLIAM MacKINNON

(Co-Producer)

His first feature collaboration, William MacKinnon has for some years worked in low budget production and script editing, both in Australia and the U.K.

His previous film "PASSING GLORY" (made at the National Film and Television School, U.K.) won the City of Edinburgh Award at the Edinburgh Film Festival, 1986.

He is founding director of the Sydney-based music promo company The Blast Furnace.

GERARD LEE

(Co-scénariste)

Le romancier et nouvelliste Gerard Lee, né à Melbourne en 1951, écrivit et co-réalisa avec Jane Campion le court métrage PASSIONLESS MOMENTS.

Lee, qui fait ici ses débuts dans le long métrage, bénéficie en Australie d'une solide réputation littéraire. Son recueil de nouvelles "Pieces for a Glass Piano" fut sélectionné en 1980 au National Book Award; son premier roman, "True Love and How To Get It" (1981), fut loué pour la diversité, le réalisme, l'humour acide et désinvolte de ses personnages féminins, et figure parmi les grandes réussites de la littérature australienne contemporaine.

Les Presses Universitaires du Queensland publieront prochainement son deuxième roman: "The Troppo Man", ainsi qu'une collection d'histoires de voyages: "Australiana".

SALLY BONGERS

(Directeur de la photographie)

Sally Bongers, 29 ans, est la première femme à exercer les fonctions de chef opérateur sur un long métrage australien en 35 mm. Elle fit connaissance de Jane Campion en 1981, à l'Australian Film and TV School, et collabora avec elle aux courts métrages A GIRL'S OWN STORY et PEEL.

Sally Bongers travaille actuellement à sa première réalisation.
